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World Learning's iPACE Releases New Conference Report: Civil Society in Myanmar's New Democracy

On Monday, December 18, 2017 World Learning's Institute for Political and Civic Engagement (iPACE) released a report on the conference entitled, "Civil Society in Myanmar's New Democracy" (held Wednesday, September 20, 2017 at the Novotel Hotel in Yangon, Myanmar.) "A vibrant civil society is an absolutely critical component of a healthy democracy, and developing and growing it takes time. . . Just look around this room -- that energy and dedication is already so strong in Myanmar. The Institute for Political and Civic Engagement (iPACE) is here to support that commitment, for the civil society and people of Myanmar to build the future of their country," said Gretchen Kunze, World Learning Country Representative for Myanmar and Director of iPACE.

"In making important decisions, civil society should be a driving force to ensure that leaders are reflecting the will of the people," said 88 Generation leader U Min Ko Naing during a discussion on civil society's role in Myanmar. Daw Zin Mar Aung, MP, Pyithu Hluttaw, Yankin Township emphasized the need for better collaboration between civil society and elected officials. "Without a strong relationship with civil society, there can be misunderstandings on both sides. ... Since last year, the relationship between civil society and parliament is starting to warm. We just aren't there yet," she said.
